



ABOUT THE PARK DISTRICT





The Lorain County Metropolitan Park District was established in 1957 by the Lorain County Probate Court. Under the provisions of Chapter 1545 of the Ohio Revised Code, Lorain County Metro Parks is a special district operating as a separate political subdivision of the State of Ohio. The Metro Parks provide residents with the preservation of open space, conservation, education and outdoor recreation programs and facilities.

Funding for the Metro Parks is provided primarily by a 1.6 mill countywide property tax levy. Other sources of income include grants, gifts and bequests along with fees generated from the Forest Hills Golf Course, Splash Zone, Miller Nature Preserve, Mercy Health & Recreation Center and facility rentals.

Lorain County Metro Parks is governed by a three-member Board of Park Commissioners, who are appointed by the Lorain County Probate Court Judge and serve without pay.

The Board of Park Commissioners is responsible for policy and fiscal oversight. The Director/Secretary is responsible for the daily management of the Metro Parks. The Lorain County Metro Parks staff is comprised of 67 full-time and 16 year-round, part-time employees, supplemented by up to 194 seasonal staff members in the summer months. Fourteen members of the Metro Parks' ranger staff are certified Ohio Peace Officers. The rangers are responsible for public safety in the Metro Parks and are also assigned park maintenance and supervisory duties. Other staff members maintain ties and conduct educational programming and special event activities in the park district.

Volunteer Support is an essential element to the success of the Metro Parks. Over the past year, volunteers donated over 25,000 hours of their time to the Metro Parks. Friends of Metro Parks in Lorain County Inc. now totals over 450 members.

2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS


CASCADE PARK, 19 ACRES PHASE 1 BEGINS

Lorain County Metro Parks' goal to create a more accessible, inclusive and sustainable Cascade Park begins with Phase 1. Park visitors will once again have the opportunity to discover, explore and enjoy the wonders of Cascade Parks' northern peninsula. Restoration of the paved trails along the banks of the Black River were made possible by the construction of a vegetative bioswale which will also reduce the damage to the park during flood season. A new, modern restroom along with new picnic shelters and a rock-themed playground will greet park visitors in Spring of 2017.



OBERLIN'S JOHNSON BARN DISMANTLING

In collaboration with the City of Oberlin, Oberlin College and a generous benefactor, LCMP dismantled the Historic Johnson Barn during the summer of 2016. A significant amount of the salvaged materials were transported to and are currently being re-purposed in a modern-day interpretation of the structure. The re-construction as well as numerous site improvements are anticipated to be complete in the Summer of 2017 to provide to park visitors and Lorain County residents with additional programming and rental opportunities.

NORTH COAST INLAND TRAIL'S BUTTERNUT RIDGE TRAILHEAD OPENING

In 2016, the Lorain County Metro Parks constructed a minor trailhead at the intersection of Butternut Ridge at the North Coast Inland Trail in New Russia Township. A 10-car, gravel parking lot was installed along with a portable comfort station, picnic



table and interpretative signage. With a generous support of the Lorain County General Health District, a bicycle repair station was installed. Metro Parks' staff also use the Trailhead as a maintenance and supply facility for the Trail and Park District.

SILVER SNEAKERS

2016 marked the first full year with Silver Sneakers at Mercy Health & Recreation Center and Splash Zone. Lorain County Metro Parks brought in the Silver Sneakers programs to provide better access to our facilities to the Lorain County Senior Citizen population. Through the program, the recreation centers gained 2,000 members.





AMHERST BEAVER CREEK TRAIL CONNEC

As part of Lorain County Metro Parks' 10-year Plan, the Beaver Creek Trail is planned to connect Amherst Beaver Creek Reservation with the shores of Lake Erie. The construction of Phase 1A which begins at the Amherst-Beaver Creek entrance and runs parallel to Lake Avenue, Cooper-Foster Road and Hollstein Drive to the Mercy Health and Recreation Center 95% complete. Phase 1B which we anticipate to build in 2017 would extend the Phase 1A trail approximately 3,500 feet north along the wooded edges of farmland and the slopes of an unnamed tributary of Beaver Creek. The last portion of the trail slope down and terminate at

an observation deck overlooking Beaver Creek. Once completed, an additional 1.5 miles will be added to LCMP's paved trail inventory.





SPLASH ZONE DOG PARK

Lorain County Metro Parks had the ribbon cutting ceremony for the new dog park on Monday, May 23, 2016. Located at 95 W. Hamilton Rd. in Oberlin behind Splash Zone, the park sits on one acre and features two separate areas for large dogs and small dogs with one main entrance. A shelter, shade trees, benches

and drinking fountain have been installed for visitors' comfort and convenience. Membership forms are available at Splash Zone or Carlisle Reservation the cost is \$10 and \$5 for each additional dog.







FRENCH CREEK THEATRE



Lorain County Metro Parks was proud to announce the inaugural season for the new French Creek Theatre earlier this year. Located within the French Creek Nature & Arts Center on the picturesque French Creek Reservation in Sheffield Village, French Creek Theatre is comprised of Ewing Theatre and Pijor Hall, two uniquely intimate, comfortable and professionally equipped performance spaces playing host to 12 different productions for the 2016-2017 season. These shows include Jekyll & Hyde, White Christmas, Death of a Salesman, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Willy Wonka, and many more!

GREAT SCAVANGER HUNT

Lorain County Metro Parks hosted the Great Scavenger Hunt exposing teams to multiple parks throughout the county. This year 72 participants raced to Miller Nature Preserve, Royal Oaks, Schoepfle Gardens, Carlisle and Caley Reservations collecting clues and completing challenges. This event gains in popularity from year-to-year and has become an annual program.

SUNSET TERRACE AT LAKEVIEW

The former Rose Café was rebranded Sunset Terrace this year. Lorain County Metro Parks contracted with A Taste of Excellence as the exclusive caterer. Sunset Terrace has become a destination for beach and beachthemed weddings and special events. Over the summer, Sunset Terrace was host to more than 20 events.

In 2016, the Lorain County Metro Parks' naturalist staff conducted 360 requested programs (those programs requested by outside groups) and 1,468 public programs (those listed in the ARROWHEAD, the District's newsletter) with nearly 150,000 people in attendance.




